### GO FISHING WITH YOUR LIBRARY CARD



Trout season opens March 1st! Salem Public Library and the Missouri Department of Conservation are partners in the Rod and Reel Loaner Program. Through the Rod & Reel Loaner Program individuals can check out fishing poles and tackle boxes for free using their library cards at the Salem Public Library. The fishing poles are equipped with standard spin-cast reels. The tackle boxes are supplied with hooks, sinkers, rubber worms, and bobbers for basic fishing opportunities. Individuals need to provide their own live bait or desired lures to bait the hook. Equipment checks out for

3 days. Fishing rods and tackle boxes need to be returned to the circulation desk, not the drop box. Items may not be renewed and are subject to overdue fines.

This program is appropriate for all ages. There is no charge to participate and no library card is necessary.


## ACTIVITIES

### LIBRARY CARDS

Many Patrons will agree that their library card is one of the most important in their wallet. Getting a card is easy. Simply present a photo I.D. and proof of address. People living within the Salem city limits pay for library privileges through real estate and personal property taxes. So, there is no charge to sign-up. Because folks living outside the city limits do not pay these taxes, they pay the library directly for the same privileges. The cost is \$25.00 for a six month membership or \$50.00 for an annual membership.

We also want to stress that anyone is allowed to use the library. The only reason you need a library card is to check out items. Even if you do not have a card, you are more than welcome to visit the library; find a place to read a book off the shelves; participate in programs; and so much more! There is also a paperback trade program where you can bring in pocket-sized paperbacks and exchange them for select pocket-sized paperbacks in our sale room. There is also always a 50¢ book sale. Discarded magazines are available and are free to take.

### **REVIEW & NEWS**

### MARCH BOOK REVIEW BY KAREN GOATKEEPER

For me March is a good excuse to raid the picture book shelves. Dr. Suess has many books worth browsing through. Pete the Cat is always fun.

The picture book fiction selection has so many good books. The topics are wide ranging. The illustrations are often superb.

However, this March I browsed the nonfiction shelves. Being a gardener, I checked out the ones on gardening. There were several and some were surprising to me."Garbage Helps Our Garden Grow: A Compost Story" was one of the surprises. The book is illustrated with photographs of children creating compost. The method is simplified from what is in adult gardening books. It is city oriented as, living in the country, putting kitchen garbage in a bin invites unwanted visitors.

"Up in the Garden and Down in the Dirt" follows a garden from the end of one winter to the beginning of the next. It stresses how a garden is more than the rows of vegetables and flowers, it is a community of creatures, friend and foe, living above and below ground. The garden is an organic one and mentions several pest control

techniques to use in such a garden. The illustrations are voely drawings. "Picking Apples and Pumpkins" follows a family on a trip to a farm to pick apples and pumpkins. The children have fun climbing the apple trees to reach the apples. After getting home, they carve the pumpkins and enjoy a homemade apple pie. The illustrations are photographs.

There are more picture books about gardening. The nonfiction shelves have many topics. It is worth browsing these for both topics of interest and the illustrations.
