

Library Cards

Many Patrons will agree that their library card is one of the most important in their wallet. Getting a card is easy. Simply present a photo I.D. and proof of address. People living within the Salem city limits pay for library privileges through real estate and personal property taxes. So, there is not charge to sign up. Because folks living outside the city limits do not pay these taxes, they pay the library directly for the same privileges. The cost is \$25.00 for a six month membership or \$50.00 for an annual membership.

We also want to stress that anyone is allowed to use the library. The only reason you need a library card is to check out items. Even if you do not have a card, you are more than welcome to visit the library; find a place to read a book off the shelves; participate in programs; and so much more! There is also a paperback trade program where you can bring in pocket-sized paperbacks and exchange them for select pocket-sized paperbacks in our sale room. There is also always a 50¢ book sale. Discarded magazines are available and are free to take.

REVIEW

Book Review: <u>Twenty Years at Hull House</u> by Jane Addams

When Columbus first arrived in the New World, there were over 300 Native American tribes just in the U. S. speaking different languages, with different cultures. Tribes lived everywhere from the Arctic Circle to the tip of South America. Much of this has been lost with the disappearance of many of these peoples.

I know little about most of these peoples. When I came across an interview with a Lakota author in a Cowboys and Indians magazine found on the free magazine shelf, I was intrigued with his list of other Native American authors and their books. This month I started small with a series of easy reading books about different tribes. Virginia Driving Hawk Sneve teamed up with Himmel as illustrator to present basic information about many tribes, one at a time. These books are available through Evergreen. I requested four of them and have requested four more.

Since I was watching the Longmire series, the Cheyennes were on the list. I'd always thought each tribe was a cohesive unit. Not so. The Cheyennes had several groups split into the northern groups and the southern groups.

Pushed out of Minnesota, the Cheyennes were nomadic traders taking goods from the east such as blankets, knives and cooking pots to tribes in the West where they got pelts to take east. Even now they no longer have a home, but a small reservation in southern Montana for the northern groups and trust lands in Oklahoma for the southern groups.

After reading the Hillerman series, I tackled the Navajos or Dine. Originally from the Pacific coast, these farmers were known to the Spanish who gave them the name. After being put on a reservation, the tribe became famous for their jewelry and blankets, both of which are beautiful. Tourism is another source of income for the tribe today. The Apaches book left me wanting more information than found in the few pages. However, all of the books have been good, basic introductions to the tribes we often hear about, but learn little about.
